The Man who Rationalizes Sin

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- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: I John 1:10-2:2.
 - B. Ways to relate to Christ.
 - 1. Relationship through union with Him.
 - 2. Fellowship, which is the daily experience of His power through a believer.
 - C. Fellowship is the secret to power. Walking in the light is the key to fellowship.
- II. Why fellowship is difficult: we shut off the light.
 - A. Some fail to examine themselves.
 - B. Some fail to believe that sin has been removed.
 - C. Others rationalize sin.
- III. Rationalizing sin is the commonest failure in the Christian experience.
 - A. This is an evasion of fact by clothing wrong so it looks right.
 - B. We argue that we have not sinned, but John says that if we say this, we make Jesus a liar.
 - 1. The word of God makes it clear that we have a source of strength from within.
 - 2. God is faithful—it is impossible for Him to be wrong and for us to be right. (I Corinthians 10:13)
 - 3. We fall because we do not choose to meet circumstances with God's strength.
- IV. There is no need to sin, but if we do, we have an advocate before the Father.
 - A. His defense is no good though if we defend ourselves.
 - B. If we rely on Christ for restoration, we will find peace.
- V. Christ took the guilt of the whole world.
 - A. Sin can never keep anyone from God because of the cross of Christ.
 - B. The believer must be the one who is reconciled to God because it is already available to him.
