- I. Introduction.

 - A. We are so dazzled by the promise of God that we fail to heed the condition.
 - B. Jesus promises that we will do greater works than He did.
 - 1. Many doubt this.
 - 2. Jesus is not saying that the sincere Christian of today will be able to do what He did in the first century--He is not contrasting our labors with His labors then.
 - 3. All the fullness of God became available to men when Jesus went to the Father.
 - 4. Jesus' ministry among men was a failure, but through His provision, His disciples' fruit would remain.
 - 5. The condition is continually believing in Jesus.
