 - 2. They are given according to abilities, so they are something besides a person's talents.
 - 3. The risk is made on behalf of the Lord by the servant.
 - 4. Talents are opportunities to put a person's gifts to work, which are given by the Lord.
 - D. The one who does well with his opportunities from the Lord will be given more.
